6. Challenging harmful stereotypes benefits both boys and girls

- 6.1 Boys gain freedom to develop healthier identities
- 6.2 Girls benefit when harmful male behaviour is not normalized
- 6.3 Families develop more respectful relationships
- 6.4 Schools become safer and more inclusive
- 6.5 Society becomes less tolerant of gender-based violence
- 6.6 Equality requires accountability rather than preferential excuses

7. Pakistan needs to replace gender-based excuses with responsible socialization

- 7.1 Promoting gender-sensitive education
- 7.2 Teaching boys respect, empathy and consent
- 7.3 Encouraging parents to hold children equally accountable
- 7.4 Addressing harmful stereotypes in media
- 7.5 Strengthening school-based counselling and character education
- 7.6 Promoting positive and responsible models of Pakistani masculinity
